Recognizing & rewarding the positive actions of our Children and Youth Youth Hero Award

- * May be a Junior Auxiliary member or someone eligible for membership, but eligibility is not a criterion for consideration
- ❖ Demonstrates a physical act of valor (Heimlich, CPR, first aid, rescuing from a water or fire situation
- Serves as an inspirational role model for the organization and the community

Good Deed Award

- * May be a Junior Auxiliary member or someone eligible for membership, but eligibility is not necessary for consideration.
- * Donates time and/or money for a worthy cause (such as troop support, raising money to help homeless veterans, a food drive, etc.)

American Legion Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA)

This fund is specifically designed to assist minor children of eligible veterans through cash grants, which contribute to a stable home environment. These grants help families meet the cost of shelter, utilities, food and medical expenses

Legionville Educational Center and Safety Camp

Legionville is a safety educational center offering quality instruction in school safety patrol methods and areas such as swimming, canoeing, first aid.
